A surgeon and humanitarian, Dr. Stabins made his mark as the founding Trustee and Board Chairman of Monroe Community College. He served during WWII as a captain in the U. S. Navy. He contributed to the Greater Rochester community by founding the Well-Women's Clinic, serving as Chief Surgeon at Genesee Hospital, and taking leadership roles in medical and charitable endeavors.



Class of 1952

An accomplished musician and choral director, Mrs. Revelle led the Northern Choral Society, doubled the group's size, and founded the NCS Children's Choir. She was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for organ study, and served on the music faculty at Central Connecticut State University. She has welcomed one and all to her chorus and still achieved an astonishing level of musical excellence with ambitious programs of difficult music.

Persian Gulf War and Director of Operations for the New York Air National Guard. His F-16 is on display at the U.S.S. Intrepid Museum in Manhattan.
